The beginning of our **One World** week will also see the start of a variety of art projects taking place across the school – all linked together with reference to Zimbabwe and inspired by the arts and crafts created by disabled children and adults in this country.

Zimbabwean Artwork

In the 1940s a local philanthropist named <u>Jairos Jiri</u> began to teach disabled people various artistic skills and organised the sale of what was produced, nationwide. Typical items include tiles, tiled tables and wall plaques, basketwork, beading, carvings in wood and stone, jewellery, and paintings. This initiative proved very popular and returned money to people who otherwise excluded from normal commercial activity. Jairos Jiri centres remain an important part of the artistic output in Zimbabwe.

Inspired by our introduction to and Courageous Advocacy support of the King George VI Centre for Children with Disabilities, Bulawayo, Zimbabwe, the children will take a journey to the country of Zimbabwe and explore some of the human and physical features of this historically and geographically significant South African country. Our attention will be drawn to one of Zimbabwe's sacred rivers the Great Zambezi, ranked the fourth longest river in Africa flowing along the northern border between Zimbabwe and Zambia. This remarkable river serves both animals and humans alike. Its immense power is harnessed to generate electricity for regions in Zambia, Zimbabwe, and South Africa. The Zambezi River is home to the aweinspiring Victoria Falls, one of the world's natural wonders. The Zambezi River is also well known for its including hippos, crocodiles, elephants, hyenas, lions, and many other species. The children will be making comparisons between the Zambezi and our most significant local river, the River Kennet.


Theme for the Day: Equality, Belonging, Inclusion and Diversity (EBID)

At Chilton Foliat Primary School we are working towards our goal to create an inclusive learning environment that embraces diversity, a safe place without prejudice, where all our pupils and staff can thrive and grow within a caring, aspirational and outward looking culture. Hand in hand with our parent and wider community, and underpinned by our core Christian Vision and Values, we seek to challenge prejudice and eliminate all forms of discrimination; we are building a culture of equality. We promote equality through:

- Sharing knowledge which helps our pupils to advocate for equality, understand how they should be treated and how to treat others
- Delivering a curriculum which promotes equality, diversity, and inclusion of all the protected characteristics
- Creating a safe environment for our children to challenge, discuss, explore, and form lasting values, morals, and opinions
- Living out our core Christian values.

During the day, each class will explore a different Equality, Belonging, Inclusion or Diversity theme which will help our children work towards achieving our EBID goals.

Show Racism the Red Card is one of the UK's leading educational anti-racism charities with the aim of promoting anti-racism amongst all young people. Using their tried and trusted educational resources, Muntjac children will be considering what impact racism can have on individuals and their families and in turn get pupils thinking about how to promote respect within school and in society.



Sika Class – Representation Matters

Representation Matters is an educational training consultancy, based in Bristol, whose foundation is rooted in addressing racial inequalities. Their aims are to:

- foster environments where everyone feels valued and understood
- where racism exists, challenge it by promoting a better understanding of the complexities of race and,
- support the mental health and wellbeing of all young people who face any kind of prejudice.





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An educator from Representation Matters will be working with Sika Class, presenting a session on Diversity and Inclusion and leading follow-on activities covering the following topics:

- Foundation knowledge of Bias, Stereotypes, Prejudice and Discrimination
- Microaggressions what are they and what is their impact?
- Responding
 - o Upstander/ally attitudes and behaviours
 - Community action, choices, values and behaviours creating and keeping respect.



Throughout the week the children will be delving into their own Prayer Passport – an amazing resource kindly provided by Open Doors. The Prayer Passport helps us to understand the difficulties for some people who wish to practice their faith, for example, Christianity, if they live in a country where their faith is not accepted.

Thursday 4th July 2024

Theme for the Day: River Day



Our theme for today is inspired by our core Christian vision providing the solid foundation for our **One World** curriculum development. The River Kennet, the river upon whose banks we sit, provides the symbolic vehicle for our children as they journey and progress through school. Our school Christian values, **thankfulness**, **courage** and **love** will continue to lead us on the journey. The importance of water remains a focus point; it is one of the world's most precious resources which needs to be shared more equitably. Our bible story, The Woman at the Well, will come to life as we follow the river, with Jesus by our side, knowing we will never be thirsty.



To bring the concept of our river journey to life, we going on a field trip to a very special part of the River Kennet. Once there, educators from the charity, Action for River Kennet (ARK) will be delivering river bank and in river based activities about our local river, its wildlife, different river habitats, food chains and much more.







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To continue the initiative our ECO committee began as part of their meeting with Danny Kruger MP, once back at school, each class will discussing their ideas on how to protect our rivers and waterways. These ideas will be translated into letters to be sent to those in charge. The children will ask Thames Water, The Environment Agency and the water services regulator, OFWAT, what they are all doing to keep all our rivers and our coastlines clean and safe.

The Woman at The Well


Jesus said, "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give him will never thirst." John 4:13
